ENABLING PARENTS AND CARERS TO SUPPORT THEIR YOUNG PEOPLE WITH POST-16 PATHWAYS

Welcome to our second Next Steps newsletter!

Under legislation introduced in 2013, young people in England are required to continue in education, employment or training until the age of 18.

Between their [school leaving age](#) and 18, a young person must do one of the following:

- Stay in full-time education, for example at a college
- Start an [apprenticeship](#) or [traineeship](#)
- Spend 20 hours or more a week working or volunteering, while in part-time education or training

In response to this, our newsletters aim to provide parents and carers with information to help you support your young person to make the post-16 education or training choices that are right for them. To complement the newsletters, our [series of online sessions](#) provides the opportunity for you to learn more about the options available, hear from relevant organisations and ask any questions you might have. You can also explore the government's [Skills for Careers website](#) and the [National Careers Service website](#), which provide lots of helpful information, including [advice for young people with SEND](#). This is in addition to all the careers information, guidance, activities and events already being provided by your young person's school or college, whose Careers Leader or Careers Advisor is always on hand to answer questions or offer support.

Apprenticeships

Our third parent and carer online session, on 5 February 2024, will focus on Apprenticeship Pathways. Book to join us!

Apprenticeships are real jobs that allow your young person to earn a wage while they learn. They can take between 1 and 5 years to complete, depending on the level. The [Skills for Careers website](#) and government [Apprenticeships website](#) contains lots of helpful information about apprenticeships

The [Into Apprenticeships](#) guide, from [Disability Rights UK](#), for disabled people, parents and key advisers about applying for apprenticeships in England. It deals with common questions such as how to find an apprenticeship, whether the training will be accessible, and what support is available in the workplace.

The [2023 Success at School Parents Survey](#) looked at apprenticeships from a parental perspective. Only 13% of surveyed parents viewed apprenticeships as a viable opportunity, while 8% doubted that an apprenticeship could lead to jobs requiring a bachelor's degree. Yet there are so many options available at all different levels!

[Career Starter Apprenticeships](#) are great for those looking for their first role after leaving full-time education and this [case study](#), about an ex-Priestley College student who secured a degree apprenticeship with local company, [Driveworks](#), is a brilliant read for any parents or carers wanting to understand more about the opportunities degree-level apprenticeships can provide.

T Levels

Our fourth parent and carer online session, on 17 April 2024, will focus on T Level Pathways. Book to join us!

T Levels are an alternative to A levels, apprenticeships and other 16 to 19 courses. They are equivalent to 3 A levels and focus on vocational skills. They can help students into skilled employment, higher study or apprenticeships. Each T Level includes an in-depth industry placement that lasts at least 45 days. 80% of the course is spent in the learning environment, gaining the skills that employers need. The other 20% is a meaningful industry placement, where they put these skills into action. The [Skills for Careers website](#) and the [government T Level website](#) provide lots of information about the qualification, including specific [information for parents and carers](#).

T Levels started in September 2020 at selected schools and colleges in England. There are over 20 [T Level subjects](#) to choose from, covering everything from agriculture to catering and engineering to science, with additional subjects available from September 2024.
